


OUTCOMES MATTER


Mr. Leathers is 73-year-old male that was diagnosed in the hospital with sacral decubitus and multiple open wounds on lower extremities. He was admitted to Park Manor of South Belt on July 25th, 2023.

Mr. Leathers was evaluated by both Physical and Occupational Therapy. The initial physical therapy assessment indicated that Mr. Leathers required minimum assist for gait, transfers, and bed mobility. During his initial evaluation he could walk about 50 feet with minimal assistance with a rolling walker. Occupational Therapy's initial assessment for upper body dressing, lower body dressing, toileting, and putting on his shoes required moderate assistance. Physical Therapy and Occupational Therapy created plans of care that were individualized for Mr. Leathers. Mr. Leathers expressed how much more motivated and excited he was to participate with therapy.

Prior to his hospitalization, he was able to complete all daily activities with little assistance. Mr. Leathers is a funny, determined, talkative, and sweet person to all the other patients and staff. He loved joking around with everyone he encountered! He was ready to start the day once he woke up and was on the move.

After Mr. Leathers worked with skilled physical and occupational rehabilitation, he demonstrates significant improvements in his functional mobility and ability to perform all activities of daily living. Mr. Leathers improved his ability for his bed mobility, transfers, dressing, and toileting to independent. Mr. Leathers was able to walk over 200ft without an assistive device independently. Mr. Leathers was able to be discharged from the facility after 18 days stay at Park Manor of South Belt and return home with the support of his family. It was such a pleasure working with Mr. Leathers!





MDS Section GG Functional Scores

06 - Independent
Completes the activity by him/herself with no assistance from a helper
05- Setup or clean-up assistance
Helper sets up or cleans up; patient completes activity. Helper assists
only prior to or following the activity.
04 - Supervision or touching assistance
Helper provides verbal cues and/or touching/steadying and/or contact guard
assistance as patient completes activity. Assistance may be provided
throughout the activity or intermittently.
03 - Partial/moderate assistance
Helper does LESS THAN HALF the effort. Helper lifts, holds, or supports
trunk or limbs, but provides less than half the effort.
02 - Substantial/maximal assistance
Helper does MORE THAN HALF the effort. Helper lifts or holds trunk
or limbs and provides more than half the effort.
01 - Dependent
Helper does ALL of the effort. Patient does none of the effort to
complete the activity. Or the assistance of 2 or more helpers is required
for the patient to complete the activity.
